- Secured by national Constitution
- > Finland, Germany, Hungary, Poland, Spain
- Laws on bargaining
- -> Belgium, Netherlands
- Agreement between trade unions and employers
 - -> Denmark
- No statutory regulation
- -> United Kingdom

Bargaining levels

national bargaining

- bipartite or tripartite
- union confederations, central employers' associations and government agencies
 taking into account macroeconomic goals
- · industry bargaining
 - bipartite
 - trade union(s), employers' associations
 - preventing wage competition within the industry
- company bargaining
 - bipartite
 - trade union(s), employer
 - fluctuates with company results

AIAS

Measurement CBC

Common definition CBC

- employees covered by a collective agreement
- as a proportion of all employees potentially to be covered
- count based on reports from social partners

· our definition, using survey data

- employee's organization is covered by a collective agreement-> respondent too
- employee's organization is covered but person not necessarily -> FI, DK, NL

· high percentage 'don't know'

- from 29% in Belgium to 5% in Denmark
